



Wikidata : interwikis

Links

Links or [hyperlink](#) can be found in Wikipedia pages in English. There are five types of hypertext links in MediaWiki:

- **Help: Internal links:** A wikilink (or internal link) is a link from one page to another page within the English Wikipedia;
 - in wikidocode, “`[[1234]]`” is seen as “**1234**” in text and links to page “**1234**”.
- **Wikipedia:External links:** links to web pages outside Wikipedia. External links normally should not be placed in the body of an article. All external links must conform to certain formatting restrictions ;
 - in wikicode, “`[http://www.example.org/ link text]`” will be rendered as “[link text](#)”;
- **Help:Interlanguage links:** links from a page in one Wikipedia language to an equivalent page in another language;
 - in wikicode, “`[[[:en:example]]`” is seen as “[en:example](#)”;
- **Help:Interwiki link:** links to the articles of other projects of the Wikimedia Foundation;
 - in wikicode, “`[[wikt:example]]`” is seen as “[wikt:example](#)”;
- **Help:Reading/Web/Projects/Related pages:** links to related pages (for mobile devices only).

Wikipedia:Wikimedia sister projects

Wikimedia sister projects are all the publicly available [wikis](#) operated by the [Wikimedia Foundation](#), including [Wikipedia](#). In addition to the Wikipedia project, available in more than [300 language version](#), each managed independently by distinct communities of editors, the Wikimedia Foundation also hosts many other sister projects which share with Wikipedia the common objective of freely sharing the sum of all knowledge. Some projects can be multilingual as is the case of [Wikispecies](#), and also centralizing such as [Wikidata](#) for factual data and [Wikimedia commons](#) for image, audio, video files, etc.

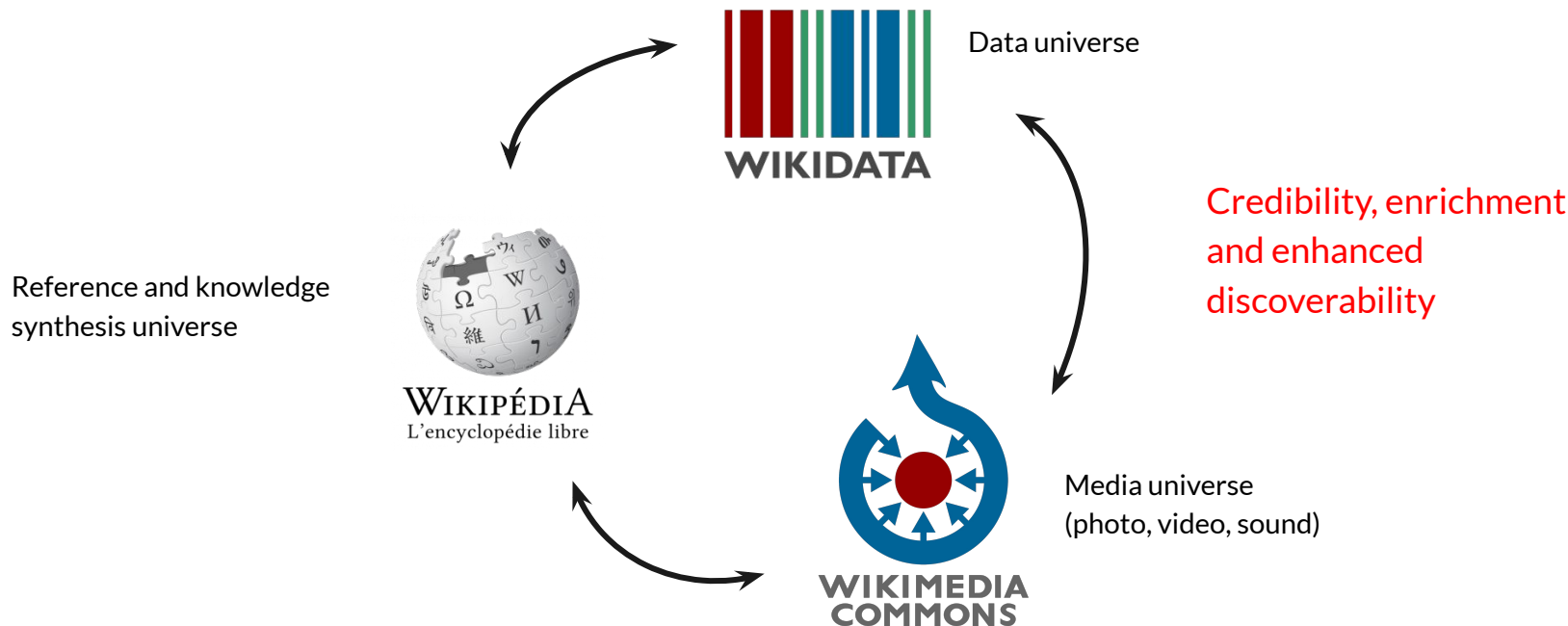

Wikidata and the Wikimedia universe

Interwiki links: the relationship between Wikipedia, Wiki Commons and Wikidata.

An interwiki link or inter-projet link is an [external link](#) towards another [Wikimedia Foundation](#) project.

Interwiki links (shortcuts) allow to link for example the pages that are on Wikipedia, to data that is on Wikidata with media stored in Wiki Commons.

It is possible to combine an interwiki with an interlanguage link. For example, `[[q:en:]]` creates a link to Wikiquote in English.

Linking to Wikimedia site pages

Sitelinks (also known as **interwiki links** or **interlanguage links**) are special links that contain a site and a title, and go from individual items in Wikidata to pages on other Wikimedia sites such as [Wikipedia](#), [Wikisource](#) and [Wikivoyage](#).

Sitelinks are for linking items to standalone pages that already exist on Wikimedia sites. Wikidata sitelinks do not support anchors (links to a specific section of a page). Anchors are preceded by the "#" character on Wikimedia sites.

For example, a sitelink for the item for [The Beatles \(Q1299\)](#) should only link to the Wikipedia page on The Beatles (https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/The_Beatles) — and **not** any sections of that page, such as https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/The_Beatles#Discography. Moreover, it's not possible for *any* item on Wikidata to link to just the Discography section of The Beatles page because this would require an anchor link. However, it would be possible to link a different item, [The Beatles discography \(Q829965\)](#) to a different Wikipedia page (i.e. one that is completely devoted to The Beatles discography, such as https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/The_Beatles_discography).



Ana Cristina César (June 2, 1952 – October 29, 1983) was a poet, literary critic and translator from Rio de Janeiro. She came from a middle-class Protestant background and was usually known as "Ana C." She had written since childhood and developed a strong interest in English literature. She spent some time in England in 1968 and, on returning to Brazil, she became a published author of note. The 1970s and early 1980s were the peak of her poetic career.^[1]

She is considered one of the main names of the mimeograph generation, also known as the marginal poetry of the 1970s.^[1]

She returned to England in 1983. One of the authors she admired was Sylvia Plath. She shared some commonalities with her in temperament and fate. She died in 1983 by jumping out of a window at her parents' apartment, in Rio de Janeiro.^[2]
